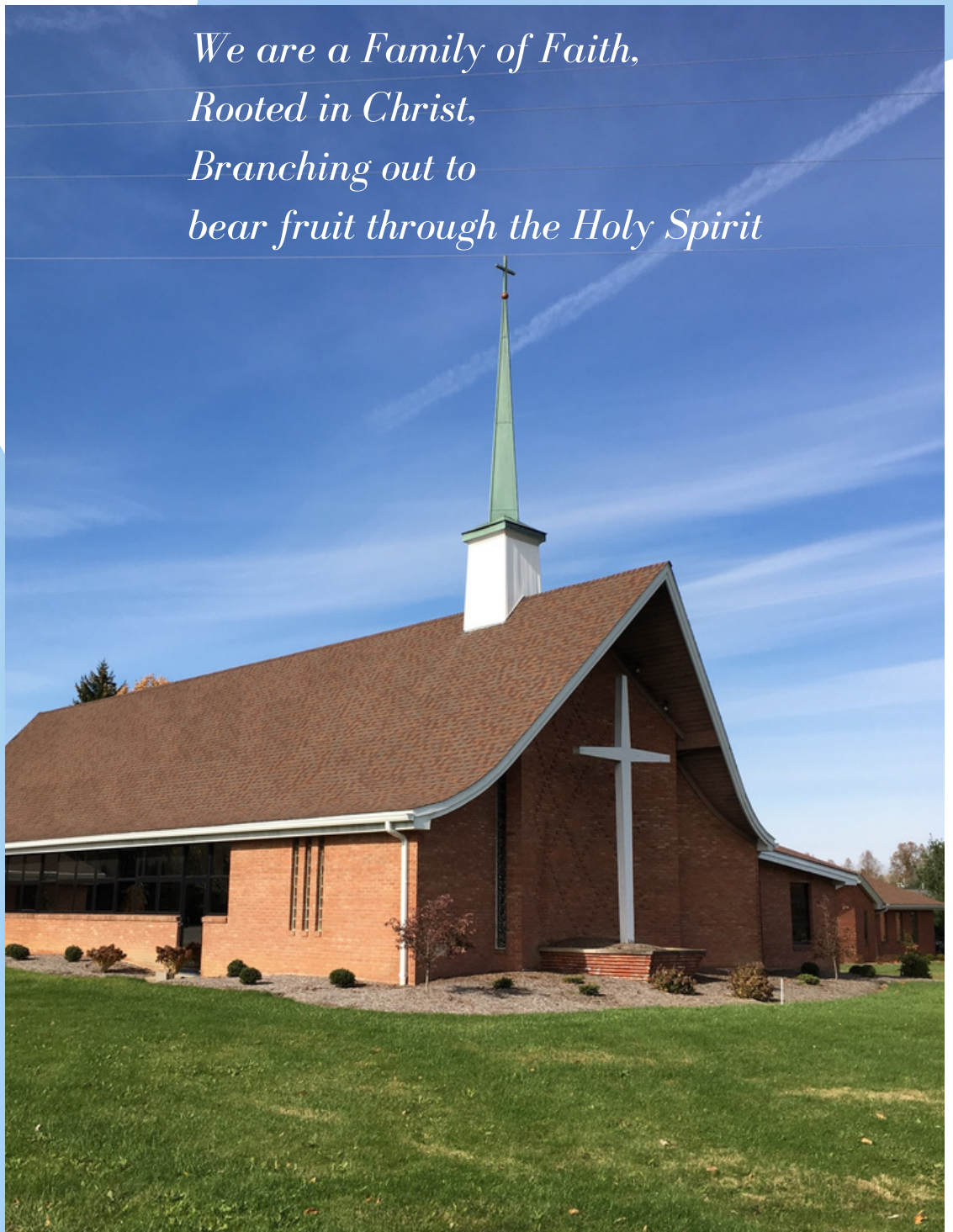

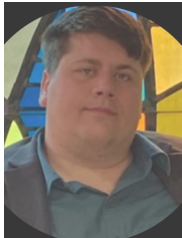

Dear Church of the Cross,

I am reminded that summer is often a time when things slow down. Or if they get busy, it is normally busy around travel, vacation, and less structured time. Summer from school, to work, to retirement tends to have that sense of feeling more relaxed. As we enter summer, I have been reflecting on Matthew 6.

In Matthew 6, Jesus begins with giving to the needy and helping those in need, Jesus then teaches us the Lord's prayer and about fasting. Jesus concludes by reminding us to not be anxious, but remember the lilies of the valley. It is always important to read scripture in context and these teachings are no different. Jesus tells us to take care of the needy. Jesus calls us to help out those who are in our community and truly in need. Jesus then calls us to nurture our relationship with God. Jesus ends with reminding us that the Lord provides and we need not be anxious. Jesus does this all-in-one teaching session. Jesus teaches us that if we care for one another and nurture our relationship with God, we can move to lowering our anxiety. This summer we will be planning and preparing in the church life cycle. As we look at this summer, it is often a time of rest or at least, not as busy, for many. Can we spend this summer following Jesus' teaching from Matthew 6? Can we work this summer to nurture our relationship with God? To truly believe and have faith that God will provide? Can we work to love the Lord? This summer can we work to nurture and care for our neighbors and our relationships as a community? Can we work to love our neighbor? As we work on our relationship with God and our relationship with our neighbors, can we start to live a less anxious life where we follow and trust in God?

Let us go forward working to trust God in all things, while doing the work we are called to. Amen.

I was watching a video the other day of a woman by the name of Doreen Ketchens, playing the clarinet with a full orchestra in a cathedral. The caption of the video said “You’ve NEVER heard the clarinet played like this!!!” They were right. I clicked on the link for the video and from the moment Ms. Ketchens started playing, it was clear that she was one in a million. Her talent and her passion for the music was evident from the first note she played...she was lost in the beauty of the music and totally engrossed in playing. When the orchestra was not playing they were just as in awe of her as the crowd that filled the seats. Even the conductor prefaced the song by saying that it was such an honor to be in the same room with her! When she was done playing the crowd jumped to their feet and erupted in applause and cheers. Once she was done playing, it made total sense why the conductor and the orchestra were in awe of her and why the crowd cheered her. The joy that she felt while playing was all over her and it was contagious! She was extraordinary.

I don’t know if you have ever played an instrument or not...for me, percussion and vocals are all I have ever really played ... but I always liked messing around with my friend’s clarinets and saxophones in band. I could make that clarinet sound like a goose gasping for air in no time. I had ZERO talent with a woodwind instrument! None. When my mouth hit that reed it was all squeaks and squawks from me. No one in their right mind would ever hear that and say “wow...she is so good!” Honestly...people would probably pay me NOT to play almost as much they would pay for Ms. Ketchens to play!

Weird isn’t it? How is it that the same type of instrument is brought to life so differently by two people? Yes, I know she probably has had a ton of training, countless hours of practice, and has honed her skills over the many years she has played. I was just goofing around during a break in band.

Honestly though, I believe the main difference between us is that she clearly has a passion for her music and playing the clarinet. I know people that have musical talent but no love for it ... although they can be good, there is something missing. They can read music, they can count and have the timing, they get all of the technical parts of the song...but when someone doesn’t “feel” the song, it makes a difference. I think any musician would tell you that when you are in love with a piece of music you practice, play /sing, and perform it on a deeper level. It means something to you. You connect with it and so you play from and with your heart. It is so much more than technic. It is love for the music.

I believe that is what Paul was trying to convey to us in 1 Corinthians 13:1 when he says, “If I could speak all the languages of earth and of angels, but didn’t love others, I would only be a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal.” Sharing our faith, telling others about Jesus, living out our call is so much more than just a bunch of technical “do’s and don’ts.” If we are not living out our faith in Jesus with love, then we are simply going through the motions. If we are not loving others as Jesus called us to do, then we “have gained nothing.” Being a follower of Christ, in my mind, is so much like being a musician. Some people have the rules (technic) memorized and follow them to the letter...and they expect others to do the same. They can say the right words and do the right things, but if they do not do these things with love as the motive, then it is just an empty clanging noise to the ears of those who hear it. God’s love changes us. God’s love changes those around us. Without His love working in and through us, we are wasting our time. Loving others the way Jesus did means we WILL be made uncomfortable. We WILL be asked to connect heart to heart with people in places we would rather not think of. We WILL be asked to sacrifice and work hard and be stretched beyond what we feel we can ... but if we are willing to do these things with LOVE, then lives are changed. The acts of service and faithfulness we do, when done with love, bring faith to life. It is more than technic. It is love for God.

I pray today, wherever you are sitting reading this, that you will close your eyes, breath in deep, and ask the Lord of melody and life to fill your heart with love for those you will encounter today. Ask Him to make you a blessing to someone you see today...and ask Him to teach you to love them the way He loves them. To see them the way He sees them. To feel the compassion towards them and the connection with them that He does. I pray that when you say yes to loving others the way God has called you to, that you will have a passion and hunger for it ... and that love will always fill your songs and your soul.

CAMO IN REVIEW 2024-2025

CAMO has completed their 32nd year. CAMO'S impact was made possible by the generosity of donors, and dedication of the Honduran and US staff. Each person-whether giving time, talent, or resources plays a vital role in the impact and outcome. There is a story behind every life touched and every service delivered making lasting changes in people's lives. Through the united effort, CAMO continues to sustain 81% self-support in Honduras, with the remaining funds provided by generous partners. This year marked the start of construction on our new 43,560 sq ft warehouse which will provide continued growth and impact for years to come.

The Year Numbers:

- 217,767 Medical services performed
- 7,946 Boxes of Medical Supplies donated
- 626 Pieces of Medical equipment
- 3,034 People Educated
- 492 Volunteers in Honduras & the US



- Medical services expanded - 151 brigades reached underserved communities
- Education – medical training certified 1,393 life-saving courses
- Community development – expanded trade school & daycare, improved by upgrading facilities & improved community care
- Donations – volunteer impact 158 volunteers processed & shipped medical supplies from us
- Global reach - supported 60 institutions & 11 departments (states) with \$2.3 million in donations.
